As many of you know I work for UC Libraries and I would like to present a few great library resources within the neighborhood you may not be aware of.

The Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County (PLCHC) is one of the largest public library systems in the country offering access to books, videos, and music, both in hard copy format and electronically on-line. While CUF does not have its own branch, there are branches close by in Corryville, Clifton, and Downtown. Did you know as a cardholder of the PLCHC you can order materials on-line from 27 public library systems and 90 academic libraries from across Ohio for pick up at the PLCHC library of your choice free of charge? This is available thanks to two statewide library consortia, one for public libraries called SearchOhio, and another for academic libraries called OhioLINK. PLCHC and UC Libraries belong to these respective constortia. These consortia also allow PLCHC cardholders to go to any member library to borrow directly on their PLCHC card.

UC Libraries (UCL) ranked in the top 50 of research library systems in North America by the Association of Research Libraries. There 13 subject and location specific libraries in its system, including libraries devoted to classics, music, rare books, and the sciences among others. UCL locations are open to the public and, as mentioned, most of its circulating materials can be borrowed directly with a PLCHC card. UCL also offers many resources of local interest on-line such as Cincinnati Birth and Death Records 1865-1912 (great for local genealogical research) and an extensive collection of photos of Cincinnati streets and buildings taken by the office of the City Engineer from 1920 to 1956 documenting construction the subway system and street

improvements, as well as the UC yearbook (Cincinnatian) and newspaper (News Record). Cincinnati is one of four locations for the Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) and is home to both the Klau Library and the Jacob Rader Marcus Center of The American Jewish Archives. Its network forms the second largest Jewish library in the world. Largely supporting the teaching and research mission of HUC-JIR, it also make available materials on the history of Jews and Jewish communities in the Western Hemisphere. Access is available to the community.

The library resources available to CUF residents (and others) are great – I encourage you to take advantage of them!

#### **NSP**

The Neighborhood Support Program (NSP) was initiated by the City of Cincinnati to provide funds to community councils in support of neighborhood projects and activities. Many councils use these funds to assist with membership drives, publish newsletters, engage in beautification and clean-up activities, provide summer employment or cultural activities to neighborhood youth, and underwrite the cost of sending community leaders to workshops and other training and networking opportunities, among other things.

There are currently 51 neighborhood councils recognized in the City of Cincinnati. NSP is an annual process open only to these 51 neighborhood councils. Councils must submit an annual proposal that has been approved by residents living within that neighborhood.


At the November CUF meeting we will be voting on our 2015 NSP proposal.

Quoting the CPA newsletter: "Formed in 2012, Spring in Our Steps (SiOS) is a Cincinnati-based initiative to take back neighborhood infrastructure -- forgotten spaces such as city steps, alleys, and sidsewalks -- and reclaim them for the pedestrian.

SiOS's hardworking volunteers have completed 120 cleanup projects in OTR, Mt. Auburn, Clifton Heights and Northside, beautifying and celebrating these forgotten spaces, improving safety and holding fun events to engage the community."

## Share your neighborhood memories

Cincinnati residents will have a chance to share their recollections about old neighborhoods, including some that no longer exist, at a new photo exhibit documenting 20th century life in the city. For the first time, the stunning photos by Daniel J. Ransohoff, George S. Rosenthal and Ben Rosen are being exhibited together at the Cincinnati Skirball Museum and The Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives on the campus of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. The exhibit, which is being displayed until Dec. 21, is part of FotoFocus, the citywide biennial celebration of photography.

"We hope to start a conversation about these neighborhoods, especially the West End, that were such a big part of the fabric of the city," said Abby S. Schwartz, director of the Skirball Museum and curator of the show.

The 60 black-and-white photos document the architecture of the West End before construction of Interstate 75 split communities apart. They show the stark reality of life as families struggled with poverty in neighborhoods throughout Cincinnati. And they depict historic events in the city, including the devastation of the 1937 flood.

The exhibit also will feature a panel discussion with local historians, scholars and consultants focusing on the West End.

The panel discussion will be at 7 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 12 at Mayerson Hall on the HUC-JIR campus. It will be free and open to the public. ## New Office of Performance & Data Analytics

Cincinnati's new Office of Performance and Data Analytics is designed to boost customer service and save taxpayer money through greater accountability and improved efficiency.

Chad Kenney Jr. will lead the office as it focuses on three main objectives:

- Design and implement performance management agreements with department heads.
- Establish an Innovation Lab to address some of the City's most challenging operational and customer service issues.
- Design and establish a Citistat program, which will use data to methodically zero in on areas of underperformance and improve service throughout city government.

Mr. Kenney previously served as the Director of Baltimore's CitiStat program, a nationally recognized performance management system. He led a team in developing key performance indicators for Baltimore City, a government with an annual budget of \$3.4 billion and 15,000 employees serving 620,000 residents.

His accomplishments include helping to lead changes within the Baltimore Fire Department that are projected to save \$70 million over 10 years while increasing pay 14.5% for firefighters; increasing customers' satisfaction with Baltimore city services from 50% to 70%; and managing a survey of all 72,000 street lights to find wasted money on non-functioning lights.

Kenney also spent two years as a Teach for America Corps Member, teaching high school mathematics at a Baltimore City Public School. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Mathematics and a Masters in Teaching degree from Johns Hopkins University.
