## **From the President's desk**



Final Letter from the President July 2011

I am proud to be a member of the CUF Neighborhood Association. We have seen some great accomplishments in these last 3 years, and they are truly community accomplishments, not just individual accomplishments.

We have worked on parks, cleaning and mulching, even adding new picnic benches and sidewalk improvements to Classen Park. We have seen Paul Gallagher, with his undefeatable spirit, planting more and more trees and caring for the ones already there. Truly a tree focused community! And Suzanne Summer still leads neighborhood clean ups, turning an onerous job into a social and community-building activity.

We have seen the beginning of plans for a parking permit system. Volunteers from the community are working to see how to make the parking issues better for our community. Now that Pendleton and Downtown and Clifton are also working on this, we look forward to the idea of protecting the streets for the people who live in this community.

## **Minutes of the CUF General Meeting 6-21-11**

Officer Lisa Johnson gave the police report. Crime stats are down for our area. She warned of recent home improvement scam artists. If graffiti is found please email or call her. Take pictures and use Keep Cincinnati Beautiful to clean up graffiti. Lisa is creating a list of panhandlers. They will be giving out citations for excessive fireworks.

Officer Aaron Frey gave the UC report. Bike thefts on campus are up. He reminded everyone to use good bike locks. Theft from autos is also up. Corbett roof construction is underway. Our tax exempt status is in question and the group will work to get this clarified and fixed.

### Nathan Hess

I have been a CUF resident for 24 years and a member for most of that time. A professional photographer, I've owned and operated my business, Walsh Photography, since 1980. My wife Maureen France and I have raised two great kids here and that is one reason we continue to work for the improvement of this community.



## What is CHCURC?

The Clifton Heights Community Urban Redevelopment Corporation (CHCURC) is one of several 501(c)3 CURCs established with the University of Cincinnati and its adjacent neighborhoods. As its name suggests, CHCURC is the non-profit redevelopment corporation in charge of the Clifton Heights neighborhood and more specifically the Clifton Heights neighborhood business district as bounded by Calhoun and West McMillan Streets to the North and South and Vine and Rohs Streets to the East and West respectively.

In 1999, the City and University funded an Urban Renewal Plan process that engaged the community's stakeholders ultimately resulting in the formation of CHCURC in 2001 as a means to implement the Plan. CHCURC is governed by a Board of Trustees composed of 3 Trustees from the Clifton Heights Business Association, and one each from UC, and the CUF Neighborhood Association. These five Trustees are volunteers and serve at the will of their Member organization.

CHCURC's first project was University Park Apartments and Calhoun Street Marketplace, the apartment-style student housing project on the North side of Calhoun Street. Currently, CHCURC is pursuing several other development opportunities. The first development, U Square, is in partnership with Towne Properties and Neyer and is actually composed of two separate sites, one at the corner of Vine and Calhoun and the other across from University Park Apartments. CHCURC is also working with its partner Paran Management and HineSite Strategies to renovate Old St George into a boutique hotel.

In addition to this development activity, CHCURC actively assists its Member organizations in grant writing and project management efforts. Projects that have grown out of these partnerships include the Neighborhood Business District Façade Improvement Program and the renovated Clifton Ave median, a \$150,000 renovation of Classen Park and brand new streetscapes on West McMillan (between West Clifton and Clifton Avenues) and on both sides of Ohio Avenue (between Calhoun and West McMillan Streets) and Calhoun Street East to Scioto Street.

## CHCURC update

The Old St George roof project is going according to plan and will begin in mid-end of July. The engineer and contractor met and agreed that the project should be able to use just scaffolding which would save time and money, rather than having to close down Calhoun to use a lift.

The Old St George Boutique Hotel project is still in the fundraising stage. Messer has offered to donate their cost-estimating services for the restoration and construction part of the work. They have met with the architect and toured the site twice with a schedule of getting an estimate by mid-July. In addition, CHCURC is working with the Uptown Consortium on being a part of their New Market Tax Credit Application this Summer. Should this be awarded, this would go a long way toward filling the financial "gap" that we know will exist. The hoping is that the momentum of 65 West and U Square that the Church will be the next re-development project and will be saved for perpetuity.

The University Square project is ongoing. Towne/Neyer will be looking for community input about the proposed outdoor space in the mid section.

CHCURC is in negotiations with Foot Locker to relocate from the University Plaza (Kroger) site to the North side of Calhoun (below University Park Apts). They will occupy 2,500 square feet directly west of Five Guys and are expected to open in late September.

The Clifton Heights Business Association has applied for the 3rd and final phase of Streetscape funding through Cincinnati Neighborhood Business Districts United (CNBDU). Phase 1 is complete. Phase 2 has been funded and if Phase 3 is funded, construction will start in Summer 2012. This will bring new streetscapes to McMillan and Calhoun between Rohs Street and West Clifton Ave.



## Safe Summer Nights

The Cincinnati Fire Department's Safe Summer Nights Program reaches out to more neighborhoods in July. Please see schedule below. The program ends Sept. 29, 2011.

For the past 12 years, CFD has provided a Safe Summer Nights Program to educate, distribute and install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms within all Cincinnati neighborhoods.

The Safe Summer Nights Program has been sustained through the generous support of the American Red Cross, State Farm Insurance and a Federal Fire Prevention & Safety Grant.

Overall, since the program started, the Cincinnati Fire Department has distributed approximately:

- 32,340 smoke alarms
  - 411 carbon monoxide alarms
  - 6,159 individually packaged batteries
- Each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evening from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., CFD fire companies will be distributing smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms, fire prevention educational materials and batteries in neighborhoods throughout the summer.

The following neighborhoods have been selected for the month of July:

- July 5th to 7th: Fairmount, Winton Hills, Walnut Hills and Sayler Park
- July 12th to 14th: West End, South Fairmount, Hartwell and Pleasant Ridge/Kennedy Heights
- July 19th to 21st: Mt. Washington, Over the Rhine, Sedamsville/Riverside and Carthage
- July 26th to 28th: Mt. Adams, Lower Price Hill, Northside and Oakley

The Safe Summer Nights Program also reaches out to Cincinnati residents who have smoke alarms that are 10 years or older. Smoke alarms continually monitor the air 24 hours a day, and after 10 years, the components become less reliable and are more likely to fail.

Since April of 1988, all residential buildings in the city of Cincinnati have been required to have working smoke alarms. All residential buildings must have smoke alarms installed outside of sleeping areas and on every level, such as basements,

cellars and finished attics. Apartment owners are required to provide smoke alarms for their tenants.

Music on the Trails is part of a series of concerts being produced through the sponsorship of the Groesbeck Fund, and with the support of The Clifton Town Meeting, the Uptown Consortium, and CityBeat Magazine.

This series will also include The Concert by the Lake on September 10th, an afternoon of live music and fun for the entire family located along Burnet Woods Lake. ## Clifton Town Meeting - Burnet Woods discussion

Clifton Town Meeting, Clifton's community council, is holding a special meeting to promote an informed discussion within the community about the proposed plans for the West Martin Luther King (MLK) Drive Improvement Project. The meeting will be held on Monday, July 25 at the Clifton Recreation Center, 320 McAlpin Avenue, at 7:00 p.m. Representatives from the City of Cincinnati's Traffic Engineering and Parks Departments will be there to present information and address questions and concerns.

We hope that you, as a stakeholder in the project, will be able to join us, and that you will circulate our invitation to your constituents. To provide a framework for the evening and to promote a productive presentation and discussion, we are circulating an agenda. If you believe we are missing an issue that is important to an understanding of the project, please let me know, and we will add it to the agenda.

We expect discussion on the following topics:

- 1) The most current version of the plan and how it has been revised to minimize or eradicate the impact on Burnet Woods;
- 2) The justification for proposed changes to the MLK/Clifton Avenue intersection and for any proposed changes to MLK east of Clifton Avenue, including plans for larger pedestrian islands in the MLK/Clifton Avenue intersection;
- 3) We understand that the latest version of the plan has eliminated the previously planned no-left-hand turn restriction into Riddle Road from MLK and out of Riddle Road onto MLK. If that is not the case, we expect to discuss the impact of any proposed changes on the University Heights neighborhood regarding Probasco Street and Riddle Road, and what that will mean for those streets and residents, especially with the closure of the West McMicken/MLK intersection;
- 4) The justification for demolishing residences on the north side of West MLK, versus the south side, when it seems more people live on the north side;
- 5) Any realignment of the Clifton Avenue entrance to Burnet Woods with Dixmyth Avenue; and
- 6) How the proposed mixed use path along the north side of MLK will connect with existing bike paths and sidewalks in the area.

Thank you for considering our invitation. We look forward to seeing you on July 25th to discuss this important project, with its far-reaching implications for residents and institutional stakeholders in the community.
