From the President's desk



The Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP) continues into the second month in the target areas. So far fire and building inspectors have completed about 470 inspections. Orders were written on 350 properties. A number of resources are available to help with repairs for any low-income homeowner. The Uptown Consortium is contributing \$5,000 to be used for painting and other environmental problems, and People Working Cooperatively will hold a "Repair Fair" on May 10. Next will be a house-by-house inspection for litter infractions: garbage cans with no lids, littered properties, etc. We have received additional funding from other sponsors of the NEP program. U.S. Bank and Third Federal Bank have each kicked in \$3,000. Since litter is such a big issue in this community, we are using these funds to partially subsidize the purchase of heavy-duty lidded garbage cans.

District 5 police have also been participating in the NEP program. Using Take Back Our Streets funding, they have provided two hundred extra hours of patrols in the target area. In February they conducted two reverse prostitution stings and arrested 15 "customers." A curfew sweep is coming when the weather improves. On March 26, a Landlord/Tenant training class will be held at the Police Academy from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm; all are welcome. Officers are now gearing up for Cinco de Mayo. There will be a DUI checkpoint on April 26th at the corner of Clifton and M.L. King to remind people of the dangers of drinking and driving.

Keep Cincinnati Beautiful, another key participant in NEP, is coordinating several ac-

tivities. They conducted an initial blight index, to be repeated at the end of the NEP program and in one year. Hundreds of recycle bins will be distributed along with safety kits containing energy-efficient light bulbs. We are currently planning activities for the Great American Clean Up Day on April 26.

The city NEP team, including representatives from many departments, meets weekly; CUF Stakeholders and Community Partners meet monthly to discuss progress with the program. Stay tuned.

On the education front, Doug Sanker and Dorothy Wilson have been working with a small group of parents, UC and Cincinnati Public Schools concerning the fate of Taft Elementary. This school, off Auburn Avenue, is CUF's neighborhood elementary school. Some radical changes have recently been instituted as it has had a history of low performance. Current plans call for the existing school to be torn down and replaced. While this is happening Fairview will be used as the "swing" school. The new school will use the STEM model, emphasizing science, technology, engineering and mathematics. UC is interested in being a partner in this effort. Doug and Dorothy will continue to be CUF's representatives in this process and keep us posted.

Finally, Invest in Neighborhoods, Inc. is the not for profit organization that administers the Neighborhood Support Program, Merit Grant Program and Neighborhood Business District Support Fund, from which CUFNA and the Clifton Heights Business Association receive funding. CUF has not had a representative on this board for quite some time. This year there will be eight vacancies on the board of trustees for which they are soliciting candidates. Positions will be filled at the annual meeting in June; terms are three years. Potential candidates may be past officers and current members of community organizations. If anyone is interested in applying, please let me know.


As the committee meeting lasted several hours, there was no official CUF meeting, and hence no minutes.

Cincinnati Public School Superintendent selection

This week the Cincinnati Board of Education launched an online survey to be used by parents, community members and district employees to provide input on the characteristics, skills and experience they would like to see in the next superintendent for Cincinnati Public Schools. The survey takes only 5 to 10 minutes to complete. It asks respondents to list their views on the top district strengths and concerns, select the most pressing issues the district and the next superintendent will need to address, rate the most important characteristics in the next CPS leader and suggest any questions they would like asked

during the candidate interview process.

The school board's goal is to have a new Superintendent selected by June 30 and in place by August 1. He or she will succeed Superintendent Rosa Blackwell, who is retiring at the end of her contract on July 31.

What is Earth Day?

Earth Day is celebrated on April 22nd of each year and it marks the anniversary of the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970. The day is intended to inspire awareness of and appreciation for the Earth's environment. Earth Day is a time to celebrate gains we have made

Smog Season

Smog is a term used to describe air pollution that is a result of the interaction of sunlight with certain chemicals in the atmosphere. The two primary pollutants in smog are ground-level ozone and particulate matter (PM).

- Ozone

Ground level ozone is formed when vehicle emissions containing nitrogen oxides (primarily from vehicle exhaust) and volatile organic compounds (from paints, solvents, and fuel evaporation) interact in the presence of sunlight.

- Particulate Matter (PM)

PM (dust, soot, ash, and aerosols) can come from a variety of sources, including wood burning, diesel engines, gasoline engines, factories and power plants. Individually, these particles and droplets are invisible to the naked eye, but collectively, they can appear as clouds or a fog like haze.

A Smog Alert is typically issued by the Hamilton County Department of Environmental Services (HCDOES) the day before high ozone and/or high particulate matter levels are anticipated. HCDOES, in cooperation with local meteorologists and the National Weather Service, determine if conditions are favorable to issue a Smog Alert. If the data indicates that ozone or particulate matter may exceed National Ambient Air Quality Standards, a Smog Alert is issued. Air quality standards are based on the Air Quality Index (AQI).

The Hamilton County Department of Environmental Services (HCDOES) monitors the levels

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of ozone and PM with a number of monitors set up throughout the Cincinnati area. Using data collected at these sites, HCDOES compiles an Air Quality Index numerical value for each day. To view the AQI, visit www.hcdoes.org. or Air Quality Hotline at (513) 946-7753.

Want to do your share?

- Use gas powered lawn equipment after 6:00 p.m.
- Refuel after 6:00 p.m. and don't top off your tank at the pump.
- Conserve electricity — turn off unused lights, computers, televisions and radios.
- Ride the bus — contact METRO at (513) 621-4455.
- Combine car trips or eliminate them by walking or biking. Contact RideShare at (513) 241-RIDE.
- Keep your vehicle properly maintained — check the tire pressure and change air filters and oil regularly. When an engine is running properly it runs more efficiently.
- Avoid excessive vehicle idling such as at a drive thru.
- Walk to desired destinations

Free recycling bin

Cincinnati residents living in single-family homes or in apartment buildings with fewer than 5 units can have a recycling bin provided at no cost. Bins are to be placed at curbside along with garbage on the regular trash collection day.

Acceptable items for recycling include newspaper, cardboard, glass and plastic bottles (remove lids), aluminum and steel cans. Unacceptable items include pizza boxes, Styrofoam and plastic bags.
