• Brendan Regan, CHCURC:Polk St presentation: Affordable Housing. CHCURC= CDC for CUF. Affordable Housing= not spending more than 35% on housing. Site is at Vine and Polk south of Inwood Park. Redeveloping Vine St is a goal. Metro will have a bus every 4 minutes. 2 old frame blds will be torn down. It's 14 pieces of land which are under contract. Polk St steps—hoping City will fix those. 35 parking spaces; 1-3 beds; renovate 2 existing blds. 30-60% AMI. No students can live here for 20 yrs. Hoping to start building in 2025. Have to have 30% of design ready to present with application. 4-5 story building; improve street scape. Need TIF money from City, & to vacate Van Lear alley behind the space. Now Van Lear is not active. It's listed as a street. Go to CUFNA Board in Feb for letter of support. 25% of TIF money goes to affordable housing. These units will be rental only with income qualifications. It's not voucher housing.

Officer Johnson sent email to CUF about sale of Van Lear alley. That's normal procedure for the police.

All CPS schools will have COVID relief funds expire next year. School budgets will be cut by 50%. Looking for creative solutions for budget cuts. CANS has monthly fund raisers. Feb 06 is Dewey's fund raiser. They have enough bb coaches for this year. Thx to Clifton Rec Ctr for their support. CANS doesn't have a gym or library. CRC lets CANS use their gym. CANS=Clifton Area Neighborhood Schools. Preschool-6th grade. Have a cheer/dance squad for the 1st time. Get Girl Scout cookies in Feb at Clifton Plaza. The food pantry will be installed outdoors in the Spring, like the little libraries. Anyone can use it or donate.

Hughes news

There's more good news from Hughes STEM High School this month:

- Principal Dr. Jennifer Williams was notified by the State recently that Hughes is no longer a Priority school! Priority schools, now called Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) schools, are considered the lowest-performing in the State, based on Ohio School Report Card scores. To progress past this status, a school must show testing scores higher than the lowest 5% of schools and show a graduation rate of more than 67% for two consecutive years. Hughes is now the only Title I school in Ohio that is not a CSI School. (Title I funding is provided by the Federal government to schools where more than 85% of the families live below the poverty line.) This encouraging news about Hughes comes on top of the news shared in a previous CUFNA newsletter that Hughes improved from a one-star to a three-star overall rating in 2023 for the first time since 2011. Academics at Hughes are on an upward swing!
- A senior at Hughes was chosen as a Marian Spencer Scholarship awardee. This scholarship was established in 2022 in honor of Marian Spencer, a well-known and well-loved Cincinnati community leader and civil rights activist who graduated from U.C. The scholarship provides the full cost of tuition, room and board for four years at U.C., as well as a travel abroad opportunity. Hughes senior, Fiston Feruzi, was one of only 10 Cincinnati Public Schools seniors to receive the scholarship. He was honored at a school assembly on January 22 that included the U.C. pep band and cheerleaders. Fiston hopes this wonderful opportunity helps him achieve his goal of becoming an aerospace engineer.

We have exciting news here at Keep Cincinnati Beautiful! For the past year, we've been working with the Sustainable Horticulture department at Cincinnati State to launch a first of its kind workforce development program for 2024 CPS graduates, as well as recent grads. We are reaching out to you because of your continued dedication to your community and to provide additional resources for youth within that community.

Through this program, participants will earn a certificate while gaining hands-on experience in the sustainable horticulture field. Home heating fire safety

The Cincinnati Fire Department is encouraging the public to focus on fire safety when heating their homes during winter. Individuals need to use extra care if they are relying onalternative heating sources to save money on heating bills. Please keep in mind such heating methods are a major contributing factor in residential fires. "Proper installation, use and maintenance of winter heating devices are essential for reducing the risk of fire and carbon monoxide poisoning. Home heating fires in Ohio are often caused by human error, particularly through the misuse of portable heaters, wood stoves and fireplaces. In Ohio during 2022, 151 people were killed in fires. Regardless of age, background or

where we live, these deadly fires could affect any one of us. Many of these fires could have been prevented. You can prevent the loss of life and property resulting from heating fires by being able to identify potential hazards and follow the safety tips contained in the information below:

- Have a qualified professional check your home's heating system annually. Furnaces, fireplaces, wood stoves and their chimneys should be inspected and cleaned prior to the start of every heating season.
- Allow enough clearance between a wood burning stove and combustible materials such as walls, floors, and ceilings.
- A wood stove should be placed on an approved stove board to protect your floor from heat and hot coals.
- Make sure the flue is open before lighting a fire, and never close the flue while a fire is still smoldering.
- Use a fireplace screen to prevent any sparks from reaching out and igniting nearby objects.
- · Never use gasoline or lighter fluid to start a fire.
- The immediate area in front of a fireplace (approximately 3 ft.) should not have a rug, carpet, or exposed wood flooring.
- When lighting a gas fireplace, strike your match first, then turn on the gas.
- Burn only dry, seasoned wood and dispose of the cooled ashes in a closed metal container outside and away from your home.
- Never leave a fire burning unattended in the fireplace.

Portable Space Heaters

- When buying a space heater, look for a control feature that automatically shuts off the power if the heater falls over.
- Never leave a heater on when you are not in the room or when you go to sleep, and do not leave children or pets unattended around any heating source. Unplug it when you are not using it.
- Don't use an extension cord with an electric portable heater. The current from the heater could melt the cord and cause a fire.
- Don't plug more than one heating device into an outlet.
- Never use electric heaters near water like in your bathroom or near a water heater.

Extension Cords - Ohio Fire Code

• Extension cords and flexible cords shall not be a substitute for permanent wiring.

Extension cords and flexible cords shall not be affixed to structures, extended through walls, ceilings, or floors, or under doors or floor coverings, nor shall such Home Heating Fire Safety

- Allow enough clearance between a wood burning stove and combustible materials such as walls, floors, and ceilings or floors, or under doors or floor coverings, nor shall such cords be subject to environmental damage or physical impact. Extension cords shall be used only with portable appliances.
- Extension cords shall be plugged directly into an approved receptacle, power tap or multi-plug adapter and, except for approved multi-plug extension cords, shall serve only one portable appliance.
- The ampacity of the extension cords shall be not less than the rated capacity of the portable appliance supplied by the cord.
- Extension cords shall be maintained in good condition without splices, deterioration, or damage.
- Extension cords shall be grounded when serving grounded portable appliances.


CPD and CFD Cadets

A permanent resident is defined as one residing year around within the CUF community for at least four consecutive years (48 months) immediately preceding consideration of Member status. The burden of satisfying the requirement of permanent residency is upon the individual seeking to be a Member.
